

Calgary Essentials

Location: In the foothills of Alberta's Rocky Mountains, at the junction of the Bow and Elbow Rivers.

Origin of Name: Calgary was named by Lieutenant-Colonel James Farquharson MacLeod of the North West Mounted Police in 1876. He took the name from the estate of the same name on the Isle of Mull, the ancestral home of his Scottish cousins, the MacKenzies.

Official Name: Heart of the New West (according to the Calgary Economic Development Corporation).

City Nicknames: Cow Town, Stampede City, C-Dot.

Official Flower: In 1991, the city adopted the Red Pasque Flower (*Anemone pulsatilla* "Rubra") as its floral emblem. This flower is a fitting symbol for Calgary as it closely resembles the Prairie Crocus which grows in the Calgary area. Unlike the Prairie Crocus, the Red Pasque Flower has been hybridized and can be grown by gardeners.

Official Flag: Calgary's official flag was designed by Gwin Clarke and Yvonne Fritz and was adopted in 1983 as a result of a contest. The design contains a cowboy hat and the letter "C" on a red background. The stetson has a hand-like shape and is a symbol of hospitality.

Calgary's Crest: Calgary's crest, adopted in 1902, was again the result of a contest. The upper third of the crest shows the setting sun above a mural crown — a symbol of loyalty — and the Rocky Mountains. The lower two-thirds bear the red cross of St. George and the Canadian maple leaf inset by a bull buffalo, all supported by a horse and steer. Below the shield are the Canadian maple leaf, the leek of Wales, the shamrock of Ireland, the rose of England and the thistle of Scotland.

POPULATION IN PERSPECTIVE

Calgary is the fifth largest municipality in Canada — after Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver and Ottawa. Its population of one million makes it about a fifth the size of Toronto (5.3 million).

Calgary has about as many people as the small nations of Trinidad & Tobago (1,088,600) and East Timor (1,040,900), and has about a quarter of the population of Ireland (four million).

Take 5 WILL FERGUSON'S TOP FIVE THINGS YOU MAY NOT KNOW ABOUT CALGARY

Will Ferguson was born and raised in Alberta. An author, humorist and historian, he has traveled the world, recounting in ten books and countless newspaper and magazine columns his adventures abroad and offering his perspectives on his home country.

Ferguson's first book, a tale of reverse-culture shock titled *Why I Hate Canadians*, sold more than 50,000 copies. The follow-up, *How to Be Canadian*, has sold more than 200,000 copies and was awarded the CBA Libris Award for Non-Fiction Book of the Year. His *Canadian History for Dummies* won the Canadian Authors Association Award for History. His book *Happiness and How to Be a Canadian* were short-listed for the Stephen Leacock Medal for Humour, the first time an author had been nominated twice in one year. *Happiness* took home the prize as did his *Beauty Tips from Moose Jaw* in 2005. Ferguson was also awarded the Pierre Berton Award by Canada's National History Society. He lives in Calgary with his wife Terumi and their two sons.

1. Calgary is one of the most educated cities in Canada, nudged out only by Ottawa in the number of postgraduate degrees. Instead of bestowing visitors with a white hat, perhaps we should be giving them honorary degrees instead. That would certainly reflect Calgary's demographics more accurately. There's a good deal more MBAs in this city than cowboys.

2. Calgary is a heartland for volunteerism. You may have heard this claim before. Well, it's true. The Canadian Centre for Philanthropy

CALGARY JOINS THE MILLION CLUB

On July 24, 2006, Calgary welcomed its millionth bouncing baby citizen. Dashiell Waite, weighing in at nine pounds, ten ounces, was welcomed into the world by a host of business and community leaders, including Mayor Dave Bronconnier who celebrated the occasion by white hatting the wee tyke. Instead of the usual wide brimmed Stetson bestowed on visiting dignitaries and notables, little Dashiell was given a specially knitted white cap with "Calgary One Million" embroidered across the front.

has reported that Calgarians donate 50 percent more to charities than the national average, and far ahead of Toronto. This is a "booster city" in the best sense, and even at one million people, Calgary still has that civic spirit.

3. Calgary has one of the highest Green Party votes in Canada, second only to Victoria. In fact, three out of Calgary's eight ridings gave the Green Party more than 10 per cent support – a significant milestone for the environmental movement. Maybe Elizabeth May should have run in Calgary Centre instead?

4. Despite its public image, Calgary is a green city. Montreal's *Maisonneuve Magazine* has stated that "Calgary's commitment to green power is the largest in North America," with commitments in place for the city to run on 75 percent green sources (such as wind power), with greenhouse gas emissions to be cut by 50 percent below its 1990 levels within five years. No other city in Canada – or the continent – can match this.

5. Calgary has a break-out theatre scene. Following the trail blazed by Edmonton, Calgary has embraced new and innovative theatre. This is a young city with an optimistic air. It's a city open to new ideas, something reflected in what is now one of the strongest arts and new theatre scenes in Canada. When Douglas Coupland launched his one-man play *September 10, A Play* he chose Calgary for its debut.

HEALTH CARE

Calgary has three major hospitals: the Foothills Medical Centre, the Rockyview General Hospital and the Peter Lougheed Centre, all overseen by the Calgary Health Region. A medical evacuation helicopter (Stars Air Ambulance) operates under the auspices of the Shock Trauma Rescue Safety.

Calgary also has the Tom Baker Cancer Centre (located in the Foothills Medical Centre), the Alberta Children's Hospital and the Grace Women's Health Centre providing a variety of care, in addition to hundreds of smaller medical and dental clinics. The University of Calgary Medical Centre also operates in partnership with the Calgary Health Region.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The City of Calgary Emergency Medical Services (EMS) experiences over 96,000 emergency responses a year, and operates 44 advanced life support (ALS) response vehicles during peak times.

- Calgary is home to DeVry Career College's only Canadian campus.
